Starting from “the roots”

The launch – Phase I: Initiation of Research and Data Collection

RADEX project is kicking off! With the support of the Erasmus+ Programme, this project is aimed to support young people at risk by raising their awareness around radicalisation. As a first step, a research will be carried out to identify potential stakeholders to be interviewed.

This phase is starting through building a methodological framework that highlights the indicators to be used in the upcoming phases of the project, as well as using both online and offline sources for data collection and analysis. Data collection will be conducted in the form a desk research, analysing already existing media outlets as well as in the form of interviews with a sample of radicalised young people and their parents, police and ministry officials, in order to be able to obtain a wholistic view on their stories. A final report showcasing the different patterns of youth violent radicalisation within Europe will be generated based on the analysis made from the data collected. Of course, all these outputs will be available through the project’s communication channels, follow us to know more!

Starting in December 2020, the project is co-funded by the Erasmus+ programme, aiming to support young people at risk by providing them with an online platform that will include modules on youth violent radicalisation, a simulation video to showcase how, when and where different types of radicalisation processes may take place, and to whom they are addressed.

RADEX brings together a strategic partnership of 6 cross-sector organisations from 6 Erasmus+ countries to address multiple Horizontal and sectorial priorities: RJ4All (UK), Synthesis Center (Cyprus), ALDA (France), Ingenious Knowledge (Germany), Inclusive Europe (Belgium).
